The Edgecombe Performance Series kicks off this evening in the Keihin Auditorium on the Tarboro campus of Edgecombe Community College, and a monumental show is already garnering interest.

"We are excited to serve the community through the 18th season, and we will be bringing a variety of shows," says Dr. Doneva Chavis, cultural arts director for ECC. "The highlight is 'Who's Bad Michael Jackson Tribute Artist."

"Who's Bad" was founded in 2003 as a tribute to Michael Jackson's musical legacy. Now, as an umbrella organization, Who's Bad Music boasts a stable of high-energy tribute shows.

The performance series season kicks off with a fan-favorite. "Somewhere Between" returns for a third year at 7 p.m. today. Tracy Farmer, W.C. Allen, Dennis Winstead, Brad Batchelor and Scott Hartness will bring their unique bluegrass sound to the Keihin Auditorium. Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$10 for students.

Chavis noted that last year's "Elvis is in the Building" was almost a sell-out, so she expects this year's season opener to be similarly well-attended.

But can Frosty the Snowman help Billy find his real family in time for Christmas? There will be a special performance for Edgecombe County Public Schools at 10:45 a.m. Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$10 for students.

- "North Carolina Symphony Holiday Pops" on Dec. 11 at 7:30 p.m. An alltime traditional favorite for the Tarboro area, the performance will ring in the holiday season. Tickets are \$25 for adults and \$15 for students.
- "Black History through Gospel Music and Theater" on Feb. 8 at 5 p.m. Attendees can enjoy the spirit-filled and

powerful influence of gospel music. The evolution of African American culture and music will be explored through historical milestones. Tickets are \$15 for adults and \$10 for students.

- New York Theatre Ballet performing signature works by master choreographers for the public on March 13 at 7 p.m. Admission is free to the public, but tickets are still required.
- "Who's Bad" on April 19 at 7 p.m. Season ticket holders will be able to meet the artist. Tickets are \$35 for adults and \$25 for students.

The Tarboro Choral Society and Orchestra on May 2 and May 4 at 7 p.m. Tickets are required, but admission is free for this event.

A glimpse into the commitment to train our workforce

y first day with Edgecombe Community

College was Aug. 19. A little more than one month on the job, I can recall ECC President, Dr. Greg McLeod, asking, "What should we be telling the world about ECC?'

Let's start with ECC's growth and the potential for success for high school students. We are con tinuing to rebound in enrollment since the 2020-21 academic year when the coronavirus pandemic interrupted the educational progress of many current and potential students. However,

4 percent for

one-third of those students (557) are high school students taking at least one college class this semester, representing our largest number of students taking advantage of dual enrollment.

ECC is not only preparing students through its diploma and degree credentialing programs,

the college also provides services to the public, helping students gain hands-on experience. For example, our esthetics students began taking appointments Sept. 17 for facials. Other services provided by the college's cosmetic arts department range from barbering and natural hair care, to manicures and pedicures.

Preparation for those in our allied health programs, such as emergency medical services, nursing, respiratory therapy, sur gical technology and radiology, is of the utmost significance for real-life crisis events. That's why ECC is teaming up with external organizations to hold a mass casualty training exercise from

9 a.m. until 2 p.m. Oct. 5 at the Rocky Mount Fire Training Grounds and the Lamm Build $ing \, on \, the \, Rocky \, Mount \, campus.$ The event will require medical and fire assistance, all aimed at enhancing response and collaborative skills.

As a community training partner, ECC is in the process of working with Natron Energy, Edgecombe County and other colleges and universities to plan the training needed for the first sodium-ion battery gigafactory in the U.S., to be located at the Kingsboro megasite. ECC is excited to play a pivotal role in preparing the workforce for this company.

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
